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PREFACE

The purpose of this bibliography, selected from catalogues, bibliographies and periodical indexes, is to give the collector, craftsman, and others interested in pewter a more general guide to literature on the subject than has been assembled heretofore in a single publication. Most bibliographies found in books and other guides deal with a specific type of pewter or a definite period or country, hence are too specialized for the general collector and craftsman. In order to serve as a guide and to facilitate the work of the specialist and the amateur in the field, subdivisions have been made in the bibliography as follows: General, American, English, Scotch, Continental, Asiatic, and Modern.

Some of the publications are out of print, but these are available for consultation in most large research libraries and may be borrowed through lending libraries unless, as in a few instances, the books are rare. The more recent publications in English may be secured through local book dealers.

In addition to listing source material, there has been appended a list of museums that have extensive collections of pewter that may be seen. Some of these also have catalogues or other guides to their collections.

My interest in pewter was aroused chiefly through inquiries received as Reference Assistant, Fine Arts Division, Library of Congress, concerning pewter and requests for bibliographies on the subject. In order to facilitate my own work, I began to compile a bibliography on pewter. Through friends I was encouraged to make my compilation of sources available to others in the field.

Some references to works not primarily devoted to pewter are included because they are of interest to students in the field.
