While country house sales are increasingly popular, the bulk of any auctioneer's calendar continues to be based around the saleroom, where a larger selection of items can be more easily shown and sold.



Working out of old warehouses or purposebuilt rooms, they are easily accessible

for vendors and buyers alike, and a trip to the sales is still a highly enjoyable day out for the whole family.

Chapmans is able to combine several house content sales at one time in its Victorian rooms in North Street, offering an eclectic mix of pieces, like this set of Arts & Crafts tiles with sporting scenes (far right) and pair of spelter candlesticks modelled as Egyptian figures.
