#### PEWTER

THE Craft of the Pewterer began to be regularised in Scotland towards the end of the 15th Century (over 100 years after the Worshipful Company of Pewterers of London were granted their first Charter). Before that period, though some few individuals followed the trade, it is probable that the majority of pewter vessels were imported, chiefly from France and Holland.

At the commencement of the 16th Century the Incorporation of Hammermen of Edinburgh admitted local pewterers to its membership, and during the ensuing century other Incorporations followed suit, notably those of St. Andrews, Perth, Aberdeen and Dundee, and, still later, Stirling and Glasgow.

These Incorporations controlled the craft in their respective areas up to the time of the great decline which commenced toward the middle of the 18th Century. Perhaps their most important ordinances, apart from those which fixed alloys, were those which required their pewterer members to register a "touch," the forerunner of the modern trade mark, with which they were bound to mark their productions, and which, where the records have been preserved, have naturally been invaluable to the collector and the historian.

The decline in pewter-making referred to was brought about by the increasing cheapness of other and more hygienic materials, such as glass, china and earthenware; and by the mid-19th Century the trade was practically dead.

Very little domestic pewter of Scottish origin has come down to us; owing to the comparative poverty of the country, pewterware was always something of a luxury to those classes which, south of the Border, were the principal users of it. There are, however, numerous examples of ecclesiastical ware, though even these are, in the main, of late period.

Of tavern pewter, Scotland can show several ranges, some of which have no counterpart in England, but are the descendants of the Continental importations mentioned above.

In arranging the present exhibit an endeavour has been made to assemble from the Northern Kingdom a representative collection of this fascinating ware; for old pewter, especially that of Britain, has an undoubted fascination which is all its own. When cleaned and polished it has a subdued brilliancy which

is far softer than the glitter of more precious metal, and when set against a background of ancient oak it is a source of neverfailing charm.

#### NOTE ON THE "TAPPIT-HEN" MEASURE.

The Scottish standard measures before 1707 were :-

The common or cant name for the Scottish pint when made in pewter and in a particular shape was a "tappit-hen" (i.e., a hen with a top to it); it occurs in Scott's novels and Jamieson's Dictionary, though both writers were in error as to the capacity of the measure. Other measures were made in the same shape, but only the pint is a "tappit-hen"; the others are "tappit-hen"shaped.

"Tappit-hen "-shaped measures are found in three styles: (1) uncrested, i.e., with a plain lid; (2) crested, i.e., with a finial on top of the lid; (3) lidless—a type peculiar to the Aberdeen district. That the name may be a corruption of "topynet," the name of an old French liquid measure, is likely, judging by the resemblance between the measures and the fact that they were, being made at about the same time (cf. also the Scottish " ashet," from the French "assiette").

Fines box of the Dundee Town Council; at one side is a slit for fines for non-attendance or lateness; a contrivance of rods, secured by a screw and padlock, prevents unauthorised opening; pewter. This is the only Town Council Fines Box known, unique also by reason of its ornamentation, a feature rarely found on Scottish pewterware. Lost for many years, it was retrieved in 1839 from a heap of old metal destined for melting down.

The decoration consists of four engraved shields within ribbons. Upon the first is the lion rampant with the initials J.6.R., for James VI; upon the ribbon is engraved: Feare God and obey the King. The second shield bears the arms of Scrymgeoure of Dudhope with inscription: Sir James Schrimgeour, Prowest, Anno 1602, 14 May; around it, upon the ribbon, Lord blesse the Prowest, Baillzies and Counsell of Dundi. The third shield contains the initials: P.L., R.E., M.I., J.L., W.H. Bailzeis Anno 1602; the surrounding inscription is: Payment for not comeng to the Counsell of Dundie.

Upon the last shield is the crest of Dundee, the "lily pot," and the motto *Dei Dom*. There is no encircling inscription. H.: 3 in.; Diam.: 6 in.
