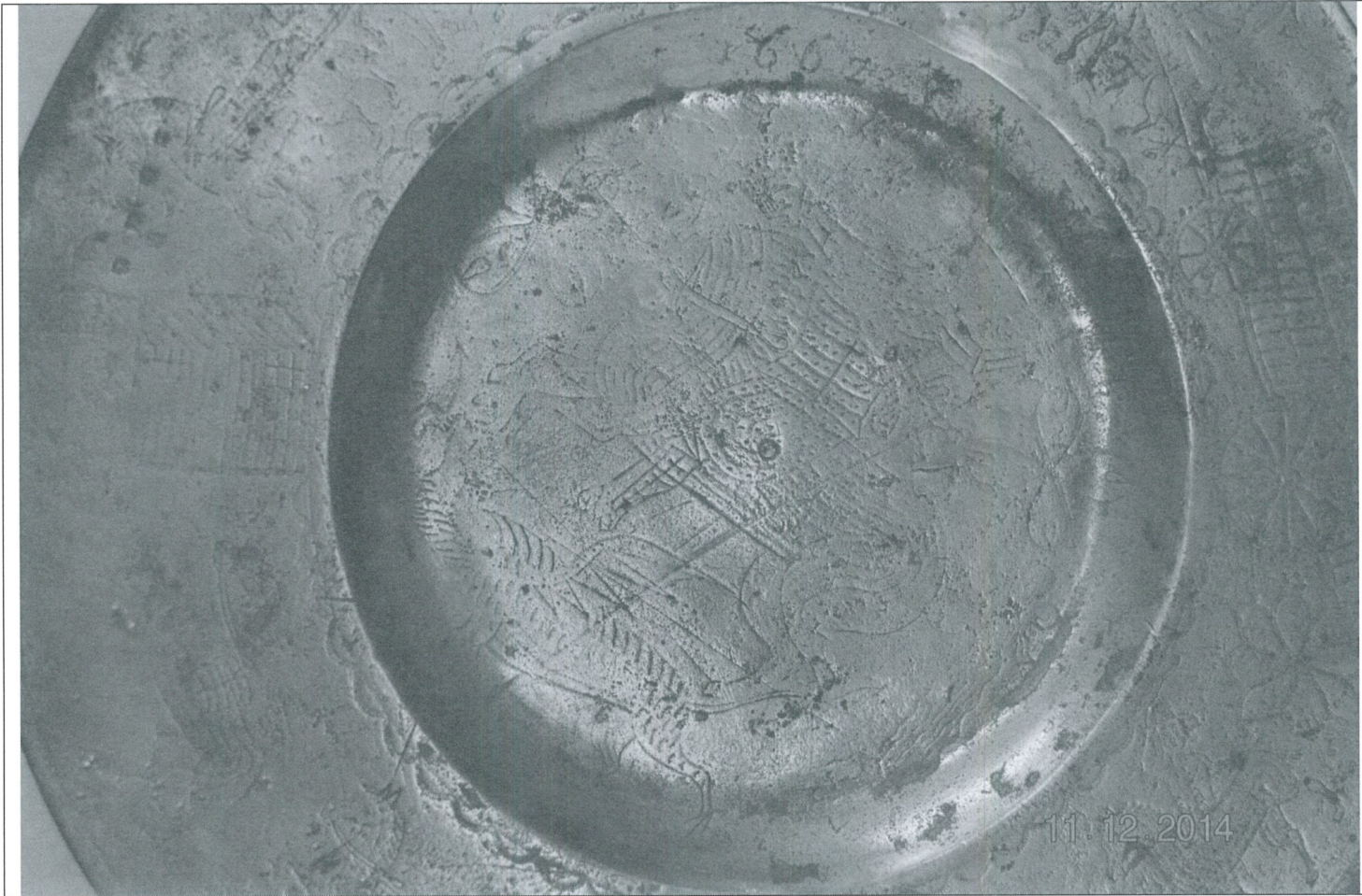
A CHARLES II BROAD RIMMED CHARGER 18 3/4" DIAMETER, ENGRAVED WITH WRIGGLE WORK SHOWING ON THE BRIM PART HORSES, WAGGONS AND AN INN; IN THE WELL ST GEORGE AND THE DRAGON AND THE DATE 1662. MADE BY RICHARD EVERETT OF LONDON (COTTERELL 1598 AND PEAL MORE PEWTER MARKS 1598) ORIGINALLY IN THE COLLECTION OF R F MICHAELIS AND RICHARD MUNDEY

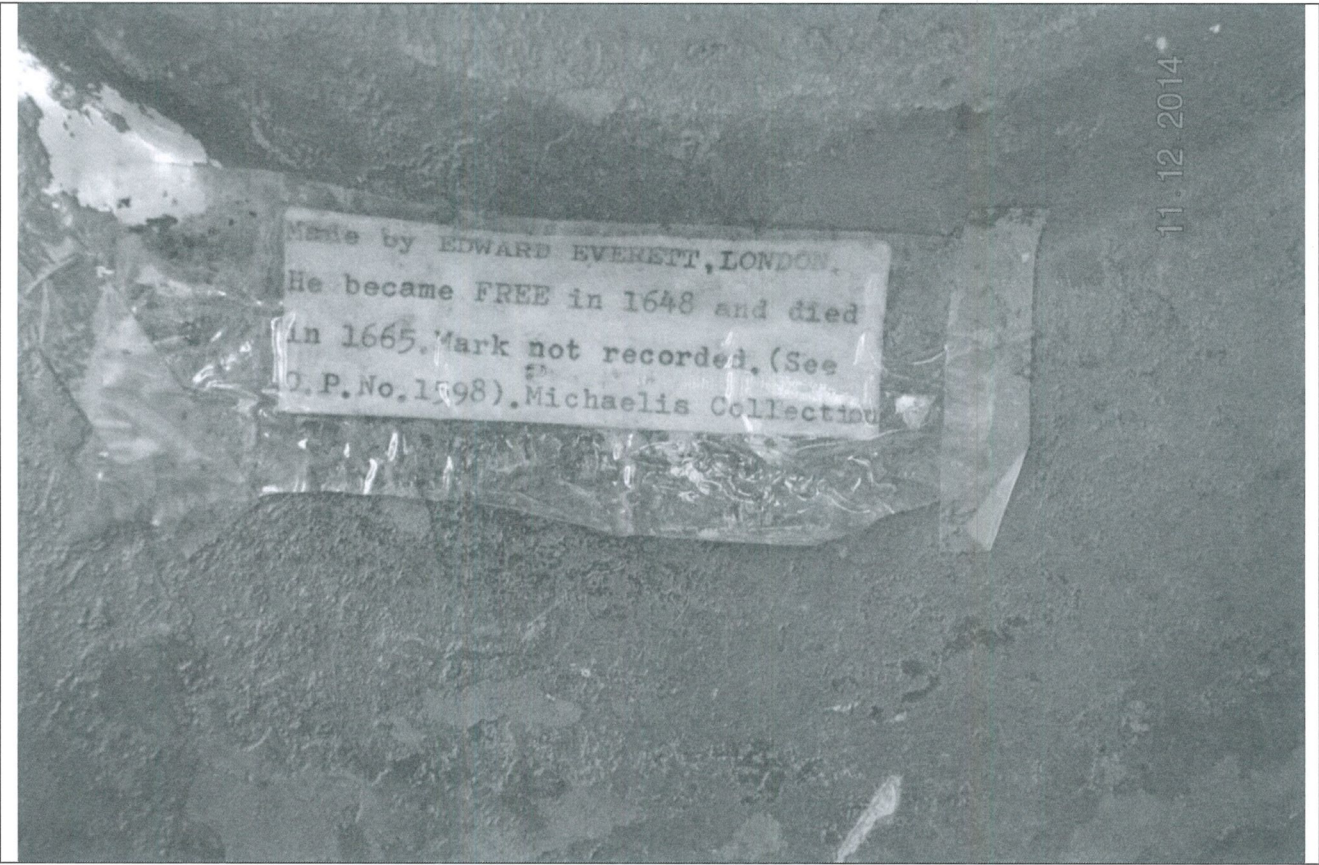






THE 2nd BROAD RIMMED
CHARGE, diameter 18-3/8";
7/8" wide. The whole engraved
with typical 17th Century WRIGGLED
WORK ENGRAVING. The rim engraved
with FIVE PACK HORSES, one MOUNTED,
drawing WAGONS TOWARDS AN INN.
Lower facing the INN are FIVE
FURTHER PACK HORSES, again one is
mounted. The WELLS is engraved with
ST. GEORGE A HORSE, and a DRAGON
IMPALES A LANCE. (The head of
St. George worn away). In the
hoop is THE DATE 1662, the year of
the betrothal of Charles the 2nd.
Also ownership initials H^{WM}. This
CHARGER may have been in an Inn
named "ST. GEORGE & THE DRAGON".
Made by: RICHARD EVERETT, the mark
repeated TWICE, once on the rim, and
once on the back. THIS BELONGED TO
the famous Author, the late RONALD
F. MICHAELIS. Reference Cotterell
No. 1598, name only. Also "MORE FEW-
WORD MARK" by C. Peal No. 1298, page 20
