The pewter has been delivered at this Office, and arrangements are now being made for it to be packed and shipped to the Director of the Gallery.

It will be seen that the total value placed on the articles by Mrs. Carvick Webster is £331. sterling, and I have therefore arranged for them to be insured for £350. sterling against "all risks of loss or damage however caused", but excluding war risk.

The insurance covers the articles from the "time of becoming the responsibility of the Agent General for" "New South Wales until delivered to the National Art Gallery", "Sydney, New South Wales".
