While this rare coffee pot shows certain characteristics in keeping with the tradition of the work of the famous American maker, William Will, the cover finial would seem to be of an English type (c.f. that on a tobacco box by Richard Pitt, illustrated by Cotterell, *Old Pewter*, plate LXXVIa).
