

## **PEWTER**



A set of six plain rimmed plates by S. Duncombe, with initials TT on rim, late 18th century. All six plates are of the same size, 230 mm. They were sold at Phillips, London, for £150 in May 1975.



A good Dutch inkstand, the tray base raised on four flattened ball feet and set with three capstan-shaped removable containers for sand, ink and accessories. Maker's hallmarks on base, 18th century. Length 240 mm. Sold at Phillips for £165 in February 1976.




(Left) A shield-shaped spoon rack with flat plate at right angles of body with six slots for spoons, by A. Heiddan, Lubeck, Germany, c.1820, 290 mm x 180 mm. Also five pewter spoons, four with round bowls and plain ends and one cast tryfid spoon, 19th century, £140, (Right) A wall water cistern with flat back, bomb front and lion's head mount and brass tap, late 18th century, French or Swiss, 230 mm by 230 mm. £150. Sold at Phillips in March 1976.




Cromwellian flagon with cylindrical body on spreading ovolo-moulded base, the hinge cover of "beefeater's hat" type with twin-cusped thumb-pieces. Mid-17th century. 270 mm. £600. (Right) Late Stuart tankard, the cylindrical body raised on ovolo-moulded foot and surmounted by a flat-topped cover engraved with owner's initials. c.1680. Height 150 mm. £550. Both sold at Sotheby's in March 1976.







(Left) A Swiss Kelchkanne of typical shouldered form, first half of 18th century, Height 255 mm. £330. (Right) A Swedish flagon of truncated cone shape, early 19th century. Height 270 mm. £280. Both sold at Phillips, London, in May 1976.



A set of eight French measures, all by Deverre of Caen. They run from 2 litre to millilitre sizes. Heights range from 275 mm to 60 mm. 19th century. £490, Sold at Phillips, London, in May 1976.



(Left) A Scots tappit-hen measure of typical form with cylindrical drum, incurving neck and collar at top. The domed cover with erect thumbpiece, c.1800. Height 285 mm. £280. (Right) An English "beefeater" flagon with slightly tapering drum and spreading ovolo-moulded foot. The cover of "beefeater's hat" shape, stamped with maker's hallmarks and having twincusped thumbpieces, c.1660. Height 237 mm. £430. Both sold at Phillips in February 1976.



(Left) A German straight-sided tankard with wide spreading base, flat lid and ball terminal. The body engraved with figures and floral patterns and inscribed Vivat, the lid engraved FGB. Late 18th century, Height 250 mm. £200. (Right) A straight-sided lidded tankard with spreading foot, flat domed lid with ball terminal. The lid inscribed GMR 22 with maker's marks on the inside. By FCW, possibly Regensberg, c. 1830. Height 230 mm. £170. Both sold at Phillips in March 1975.
